Mary O'Donnell is a well-known poet and fiction writer. Collections include *Unlegendary Heroes* (1998), and *Those April Fevers* (2015). An eighth collection – *Massacre of the Birds* – was published in 2020 by Salmon Poetry. Her most recent novel is *Where They Lie* (New Island). She holds a PhD in creative writing from UCC and is a member of Ireland's affiliation of artists. Aosdána.





Ciarán O'Rourke lives in Galway. His first collection, *The Buried Breath*, was highly commended by the Forward Foundation for Poetry in 2019. His second collection, *Phantom Gang*, is published by The Irish Pages Press, and his extended essay, *American Epic: On Paterson*, is available as a pamphlet from Beir Bua Press.

Mark Granier is a poet and photographer. His photographs have been exhibited in the RHA and the dlrLexicon Municipal Gallery. His first solo show, Ghostlight, was held in the dlrLexicon in 2019. His fifth collection of poetry, Ghostlight: New & Selected Poems, was published by Salmon in 2017. He lives in Bray with his wife and son (and two dogs).



HISTORICAL FICTION

Award winning author, Pauline Clooney was raised in the Irish Midlands. With a BA in History, Sociology and English, an MLitt on Charlotte Brontë and an MA in Creative Writing, in 2017 she left a teaching career to concentrate on writing. Her debut, Charlotte & Arthur was published in 2021. When not writing she can be found weeding, walking, or watching quiz shows.

Martina Devlin has written 11 books and two plays and is an award-winning journalist. She has won a VS Pritchett Prize from the Royal Society of Literature and a Hennessy Literary Award. Martina presents the City of Books podcast for Dublin UNESCO City of Literature and is the first holder of a PhD in literary practice from Trinity College Dublin where she has taught Irish literature.


Kevin Power is the author of two novels, *Bad Day in Blackrock* (2008) and *White City* (2021), as well as a book of criticism, *The Written World* (2022). He is the winner of the 2009 Rooney Prize for Irish Literature. His writing has appeared in The New Yorker, The Guardian, Irish Times, and many other places. He teaches in the School of English, Trinity College Dublin.

DEDALUS (UK): CELEBRATING 40 YEARS SAT 1ST Oct, 16.00-17.00, TOWN HALL







Named for the hero of James Joyce's *A Portrait of the Artist as a Young Man,* Dedalus Books (UK) was founded in 1983 by Eric Lane. "Dedalus," says Eric, "has invented its own distinctive genre, which we term distorted reality, where the bizarre, the unusual, the grotesque and the surreal meld in a kind of intellectual fiction which is very European." A recent addition to this exciting project are three Irish authors: Eoghan Smith, Dara Kavanagh, who will be present alongside Eric Lane, and Brian Keogh, whose novel *Le Fanu's Angel* will be celebrated at this event together with Dedalus novels *A Provincial Death* and *Prague 1938*.





Eoghan Smith is the author of the novels *A Provincial Death* (2022) and *The Failing Heart* (2018). He has contributed to a variety of publications and journals, including The Irish Times, Literary Review, Books Ireland and Dublin Review of Books. His other books include the co-edited collection *Imagining Irish Suburbia* and Literature (2018) and the monograph *John Banville: Art and Authenticity* (2014).

Dara Kavanagh is the *nom-de-plume* of the author of *Prague 1938* (2021). There are rumours his true identity will finally be revealed in the course of this event.

Victoria Kennefick's first poetry collection, *Eat or We Both Starve* (Carcanet, 2021) won the Dalkey Book Festival Emerging Writer of the Year 2022 and is shortlisted for the Seamus Heaney Centre First Collection Poetry Prize 2022. It was also shortlisted for the T.S. Eliot Poetry Prize and the Costa Poetry Book Award. It was a book of the year in The Guardian, The Irish Times, The Sunday Independent and The White Review. An Arts Council of Ireland Next Generation Artist, Victoria is also the current poet in residence at the Yeats Society Sligo.

WORKSHOPS: SATURDAY 1st OCT 10.00-12.00 (Venue TBC)

Developing Your Fiction with Gerard Beirne

This interactive workshop will guide you through the key elements of writing effective prose fiction. Through a mix of informal discussion and writing exercises, it will explore the structure of prose and how characterisation, plot, and setting work together to create story and meaning. Suitable for writers starting out or for those with more experience.



Gerard Beirne has published four books of prose and two collections of poetry (with a third forthcoming in October). A Hennessy Award winner, he was shortlisted for the Kerry Group Irish Fiction Award, Danuta Gleed Literary Award, and the Bord Gais Irish Book Awards.

Writing Haiku with Maeve O'Sullivan

The haiku is the shortest and one of the oldest forms in the world. It is traditionally a nature poem but is also used to describe human situations. In this introductory workshop, you will learn some techniques for writing and editing haiku. The workshop will include a short ginko (composition stroll), on which we will seek inspiration in autumn sensations.



Maeve O'Sullivan's poetry and *haikai* have been widely published, awarded and translated. She is the author of five collections from Alba Publishing, the most recent being *Wasp on the Prayer Flag* (2021).

WORKSHOPS: SUNDAY 2nd: 10.00-12.00 (Venue TBC)

Unlocking Memory: Introduction to Memoir Writing with Éilís Ní Dhuibhne

In this workshop we will examine ways of selecting raw material for memoirs and various ways of shaping that material – into short pieces, essays, and books. Participants will discuss their own ideas for memoirs. We will do one or two writing exercises designed to trigger memories and explore possible themes in the course of the workshop. The workshop is suitable for emerging and more advanced writers.



Éilís ní Dhuibhne is a writer of fiction, drama and memoir. She has published over thirty books and won many literary awards. Her memoir, *Twelve Thousand Days* (Blackstaff 2018) was shortlisted for the Michel Déon Award (RIA) for non-fiction in 2020. She recently edited a collection of 21 memoir essays: *Look! It's a Woman Writer!* (Arlen House, 2021)

Writing into Being with Geraldine O'Kane

In this writing workshop we will delve into our everyday mental health and how to unpack it in our writing. Through a series of writing exercises, we will explore and connect with our past, future and inner wellbeing.



Geraldine O'Kane is Northern Irish poet, writing facilitator and mental health advocate. Her debut poetry collection *Unsafe*, which explores trauma of the everydaywas published by Salmon Poetry in 2021.
